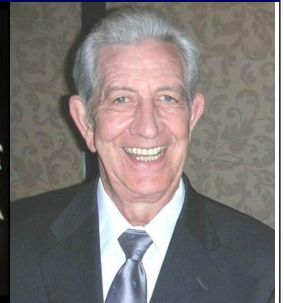

FREF's 2024-2025 Scholarship Process

Presidents, please make sure that your current FREF Unit Chairs have received the updated scholarship information. All FREF Unit Chairs and their local high schools should currently have our 2024-2025 packet.

Students with technology skills are requested to use the online version of the application. This is the preferred method, given the fact that using snail-mail has caused students to miss deadlines. However, we have added a hard copy option for school personnel to access for students who do not have the technology. We want everyone to have access to our scholarship application, online or not.

Current Scholarship Criteria

- ◆ Seniors graduating from an accredited Florida high school (public or private)
- ◆ Unweighted GPA of 3.0 or higher
- ◆ Minimum test scores –SAT - 1000 or ACT – 22
- ◆ **MUST** attend an accredited Florida college/university (public/private).
- ◆ **MUST** teach in Florida, following graduation. A copy of the OFFICIAL FLORIDA PROFESSIONAL TEACHING CERTIFICATE must be sent to the State FREA Office. The scholarship requires recipients to teach in the State of Florida for one year for every year the scholarship was awarded. If not, they must repay any scholarship monies received.

Depending on how units choose to meet will dictate the process used to sell the tickets.

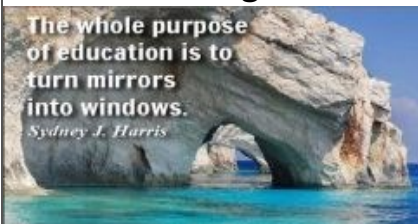

NRTA 75th Anniversary Wrap-up

In September 2022, Edwinna Williams, Harriett Jenkins, Anne Fagan, and I had the honor of representing FREA at the 75th Anniversary of NRTA in Washington, D.C. AARP was our host, and, during our 48 hours there, we may have heard presentations from every bureau, office, and division of the organization. The amount of information shared was incredible and invaluable!

Looking over my suggestion list for this column, I realized there was still much to share, so here are some of my notes. Disclaimer: The following items are not in seminar order or a particular value or ranking, just the way I organized them.

National Retired Teachers Association: The seed that grew into AARP! NRTA works with the network of state REAs to protect the interests of more than 850,000 working and retired educators 50+.

Advocacy (A fancy way to say lobbying for no pay.): State and Local races are important. (Old adage: “All politics are local.”)

AARP has our priorities front and center!

Keep Social Security fully funded. The speaker explained that it used to be the “third rail”, a charged line never touched, now it is an ongoing initiative to keep it whole. It is the most popular government program.

Caregiving—Prepare to Care

The Power of Women: The Ethel Newsletter

- Higher number of voters
- Sensitive to issues
- Overall, 60+ age group is the largest voter group!

- Involve members in “initiatives” – plans, programs, projects!

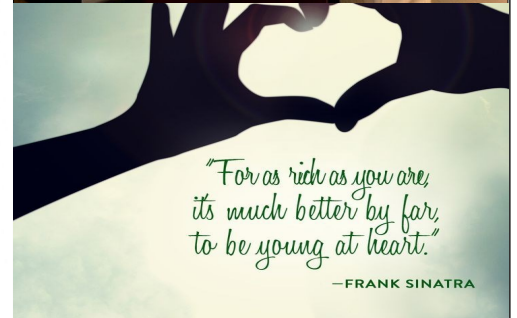

kissed,

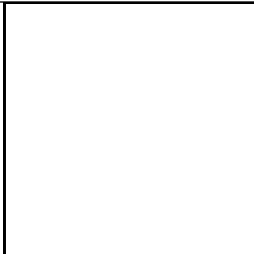
